

The Creative Industries in WI State House District 9 Representative Josh Zepnick

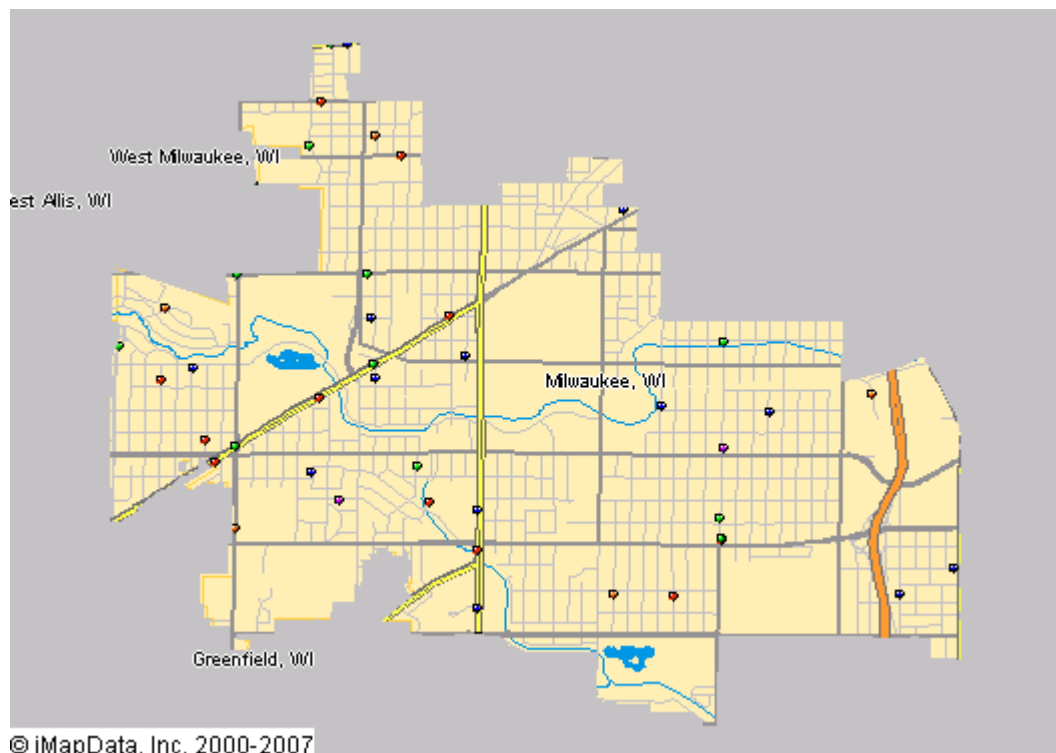
This *Creative Industries* report offers a research-based approach to understanding the scope and economic importance of the arts in **WI State House District 9**. The creative industries are composed of arts-centric businesses that range from nonprofit museums, symphonies, and theaters to for-profit film, architecture, and advertising companies. The creative industries are the high-octane fuel that drives the “information economy”—the fastest growing segment of the nation’s economy.

Nationally, there are 546,558 businesses in the U.S. involved in the creation or distribution of the arts that employ 2.7 million people—4.2 percent of all businesses and 2.0 percent of all employees. Between 2006 and 2007, the number of arts businesses grew 0.02 percent and employment decreased 6.9 percent. The source for these data is Dun & Bradstreet, the most comprehensive and trusted source for business information in the U.S.

As of January 2007, WI State House District 9 is home to 43 arts-related businesses that employ 181 people. These arts-centric businesses play an important role in building and sustaining economic vibrancy. They employ people, spend money locally, generate government revenue, and are a cornerstone of tourism and economic development. The map below provides a clear picture of the creative industries in **WI State House District 9**, with each dot representing an arts-centric business.
